

## GRENELEFE ESTATES SMALL TREE LIST

The following is a list of some of my favorite trees that are considered “small” over time, that is, they won’t exceed 25’ in height or width over 20 years.

Botanical Name	Common Name
Acer griseum	Paperbark Maple: Small maple with beautiful peeling bark, bright red fall color
Acer palmatum ‘Fireglow’	Fireglow Japanese Maple: One of the best of the upright, red-leaved Japanese maples. Stays smaller over time than most, leaves hold their red color all summer.
Acer triflorum	Roughbark Maple: An attractive, durable tree for small gardens. Orange fall color.
Cornus ‘Eddie’s White Wonder’	Eddie’s White Wonder Hybrid Dogwood: A cross between our native Western Dogwood and the Eastern dogwood. Has disease resistance. Lax branches, large white flowers.
Cornus kousa	Korean Dogwood: A small dogwood tree with resistance to anthracnose, which can harm the Eastern dogwoods. Good varieties: white flowers: ‘Milky Way’; pink flowers: ‘Satomi’
Magnolia ‘Galaxy’	Galaxy Hybrid Magnolia: large, purplish flowers in spring
Magnolia ‘Elizabeth’	Elizabeth Magnolia: buttery yellow flowers in spring
Parrotia persica ‘Vanessa’	Vanessa Persian Ironwood: A narrow form of the Ironwood, it has a nice branch structure and pretty gold and orange fall color.
Stewartia pseudocamellia	Japanese Stewartia: A beautiful small tree with camellia-like white blossoms in mid-summer. Best with some light shade, especially in afternoon.
Styrax japonica ‘Snowcone’	Snowcone Japanese Snowbell: A superior form of snowbell with an upright branching structure. Loaded with small, fragrant white bell-like flowers in the spring.
